

FEEDING WILDLIFE:

It's hard to resist feeding the wildlife but please don't – for their health and your safety.

THEIR HEALTH

- The native animals who live here, including birds, squirrels, raccoons, and other wildlife, need nature's diet to be healthy.
- Human food is "junk food" for wildlife. Well-intentioned handouts may cause disease, injury, and even death for the animals.
- Providing unnatural food encourages wildlife to congregate in large numbers, leading to territorial fighting, attacks by predators, and being hit by cars.
- Animals you feed today may be killed as "pests" tomorrow. Don't harm wildlife with your kindness...help them remain healthy, safe, and free.

YOUR SAFETY

- Native animals who eat human food...
 - May bite, scratch or threaten other visitors.
 - May come into conflict with your pets.
 - May spread disease.

Please don't feed any wildlife including birds from your balcony. Feeding animals in the winter encourages them to come to your property as a haven. After eating the food you provide, some animals may decide to come inside and establish their nests or dens. This could eventually lead to health problems, damage to your property and an uncomfortable home environment. It could also put the animals you feed in danger.

If you genuinely want to do something to help wildlife animals in the winter, instead of feeding them on your property the ideal move would be to improve their habitat.



ADVENT 2022


Advent 2022 will begin on **Sunday, November 27** and ends on **Saturday, December 24**

In Northern Hemisphere, you'll see the least amount of daylight during December. Winter Solstice in December is the year's shortest day in terms of daylight hours. That specific day can have as many as six hours less sunlight than the longest day that occurs in June depending on where you live.
